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29TH ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

MINUTES

Courtyard by Marriott - Richmond, VA

September 16, 2017

The 2017 Annual Council of the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Governor General Ann Williams Garner at the Courtyard Richmond Marriott, Richmond, VA.

Chaplain General Betty Samaras gave the Invocation. Sharon Stein led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Adele Boyer led the American's Creed. Honorary Governor Karen Hall sang the Star Spangled Banner. Jane Hampton led the salute to the Flag of the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars. First Deputy Governor Cher Sesma read the Object of the Society. Historian General Helen Werner read the Colors of the Society.

Governor General Ann Garner welcomed all in attendance to the Annual Council Meeting.

Governor General Ann Garner then presented the General Officers; Ann Garner, Governor General; Cher Sesma, 1st Deputy Governor General; Judy Farrigan, 2nd Deputy Governor General; Betty Samaras, Chaplain General; Annette Smith, Recording Secretary General; Lea Martin Corresponding Secretary General; Pat Gallagher, Organizing Secretary General; Barb Allison, Treasurer General; Mary Glen, Registrar General; Helene Werner, Historian General; Frances Jakes, Librarian General and officers by appointment: Adele Bowyer, Assistant Registrar General and Shelby Ward, Parliamentarian.

Governor General Ann Garner then introduced the Honorary Governors General: Shelby Ward and Karen Hall.

Governor General Ann Garner asked the fourteen first time attendees to please stand and be welcomed.

Governor General Garner asked for Report of the Credential Committee. In attendance were 13 Officers General, 2 Honorary Governor Generals, 6 State Governors and 10 Committee Chairmen. A total of forty-three were in attendance. Twenty one members are required for a quorum. A quorum was declared

Constance Paradiso welcomed the Annual Council to Virginia. Virginia Rouse made a donation of \$1000.00 to the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars. She was pinned (horse) by Gov. General Garner.

Georgia Governor Christine Napier presented The Calumet which was passed to all attending saying, "I Come in Peace". Mrs. Garner asked that each person stand and introduce their self with name, state and office or chairmanship.

Governor General Garner appointed a Minutes Approval Committee of Adele Boyer and Helene Werner.

Recording Secretary General Annette Smith stated that the minutes of the September 17, 2016 Annual Council were printed in the Calumet. Governor General Garner stated that the as the minutes were printed in the Calumet, they will not be read and stand approved as printed.

Recording Secretary General Smith presented the Standing Rules for the Council as printed in the program. Gov. General Garner stated the Standing Rules would not be read since they are printed in the program. Rec. Sec. Gen. Smith moved for the adoption of the Standing Rules for the Council as printed. Gov. General Garner asked for the vote for adopting the Standing Rules. The Standing Rules for the Council are adopted.

SCHOLARSHIPS

During the summer of 2017 our Society awarded a \$5,000 scholarship to a deserving Native American college student. The students' applications were evaluated and ranked by two professionals in the field of education, Janice Stevens, B.S. Education, M.A.T. and Margaret Carr, M.S. Ed., of St. Louis, Missouri, both retired educators, and Kenneth McBride, Viet Nam Veteran, author, researcher, and retired business executive also of suburban St. Louis. The Society owes our gratitude to these individuals for their time and care in this project.

When this chairman was honored to serve in this capacity in another administration we received, in 2012, only ten complete applications. This year twenty-one were received, including one renewal. There were three others received after the hard deadline of June 15 which were not considered. The fact that it was a hard deadline was well stated in the instructions The applicants were located in thirteen states - AK, CA, IN, OK, MI, CO, TN, KS, NM, NV, VA, GA, ND & one from Canada. The largest number of applications by far was from New Mexico with 8 and next Oklahoma with 4. There are 151 emails in my Scholarship file, some of which were questions/answers, but most of them were initial contacts from students looking for more information or asking to receive the application packet and my responses to them. Some were not in the right year of school or pursuing career tracks that fit our requirements, but most were eligible to at least receive the application. These inquiries arrived by regular mail, email and telephone, most from our website, some from other scholarship websites and some directly from schools whose financial aid offices keep our scholarship offering on file. Seventy-five application packets were sent out via email and one via snail mail.

This year's winner is Mr. Latrell A. Kaye, of Navajo, NM who is now attending Fort Lewis College in Durango, CO. He is age 20 and a full-blood member of the Navajo Nation. He is a junior majoring in sociology with a criminology focus as well as a minor in public health. He states his goal as "one day to use my intelligence and skills to assist Native American communities around the world. More in particular in reducing the recidivism rate and preventing crime for Native Americans by improving the overall health of Indigenous people." He is already active in aspects of these goals while also attending college. All three judges picked him as one of their top four favorites. He shows a passion for working with his people and demonstrates a strong determination to succeed in his studies as well as his future endeavors.

Of the twenty-one applications received, seven ended up in the judges' finalist lists and from that list one was chosen. Those seven, less Mr. Kaye, have received letters encouraging them to reapply this coming spring if they are still in college and meeting our criteria. We already have received three inquiries for next year's competition.

Mr. Kaye had the references, grade point average, personal commitment and financial need to receive our support. Working with our applicants and correspondents has been very rewarding, an opportunity which is much appreciated by this chairman. It has been an honor to serve the Continental Society and this administration.

ARKANSAS

The Arkansas Society is pleased to report that we are accomplishing our main goals which are to increase membership and support Bacone College. Within less than a year, we have ten new members. Eight are pictured below with Mary Reid Warner, Governor and Betty Harp, Registrar.

Our other main goal is to support Bacone College, an Indian school in Oklahoma. Two of our members have visited the school this year and presented Dr. Leroy W. Thompson, with checks. Pictured below is the Chapel of Bacone College and Dr. Leroy Thompson receiving a check from Sheila Beatty, Secretary of Arkansas State Society.

Founded in 1880 in Indian Territory, Bacone College is the oldest continuously operated institution of higher education in Oklahoma. The four year liberal arts school's mission is to educate American Indians including Cherokee, Creek, Choctaw, Chickasaw and Seminole as well as other ethnic groups. When the school was founded in 1880, it was located in Muskogee Indian Territory. This was twenty-seven years before Oklahoma became a state. Today it is the oldest continuously operated institution of higher education in the state.

We have developed a certificate to honor all members who have proven an Indian ancestor. Since it is often difficult to document Indian lineage, we want to encourage research in this area. The Dawes Commission was established by Congress in 1893. Its purpose was to exchange Indian tribal lands in the southeastern United States for new land allotments to individuals in what became Oklahoma. More than 250,000 people applied to this commission for enrolment and land, and only about 100,000 were approved. The "Native American Heritage Member" receives this certificate for establishing her Indian legacy. Jean Fricke was the first to prove her Native American Heritage.

The Governor represented the Society at the 1812 State Council in Bentonville, CDXVIIC State Meeting in Fordyce, DAR State Conference in Little Rock and Memorial Day Ceremony by Veterans of Foreign Wars in Hot Springs Village. We will have a vendor table at the Arkansas Genealogical Society seminar in Benton in October. We are enhancing our organization.

We have developed a certificate to honor all members who have proven an Indian ancestor. Since it is often difficult to document Indian lineage, we want to encourage research in this area. The Dawes Commission was established by Congress in 1893. Its purpose was to exchange Indian tribal lands in the southeastern United States for new land allotments to individuals in what became Oklahoma. More than 250,000 people applied to this commission for enrolment and land, and only about 100,000 were approved. The "Native American Heritage Member" receives this certificate for establishing her Indian legacy. Jean Fricke was the first to prove her Native American Heritage.


