## **THE OBJECT OF THE SOCIETY IS:**

To assist and encourage the preservation of records and historic sites associated with our Native and Immigrant ancestors

To cherish the memory of those Native and Immigrant Americans who waged war in defense of their people's freedom, liberty and ideals

To strengthen the ties of fraternal fellowship and encourages cooperation between descendants of Native and Immigrant Americans

To foster a spirit of Patriotism and continued support and enforcement for all Treaties and Laws made and agreed upon between the State and Federal governments and the several Tribes, Bands, and Nations of Native Americans

To publish from time to time an Ancestor Index of Society to record the names and ancestral data and other original materials relating to this aspect of American History not otherwise in print

## **HISTORY**

The Continental Society Daughters of American Indian Wars was begun in Atlanta, Georgia, by Mrs. Lawrence Avery, Organizing Governor General at her home in October of 1988.

The first states organized were Georgia, Indiana, Missouri and Oklahoma. By 1995 there were fourteen organized states and growing membership in North America.

The Society continues to build a Library which is housed and maintained by the Atlanta Historical Center, 139 West Paces Ferry Rd NW Atlanta, GA 30305

The Society sponsors a scholarship for a Native American who is studying in the field of Education or Social Service and who is planning to work on a reservation.

## **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

Membership in the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars shall be limited to female descendants, sixteen years of age and older. Native and/ or Immigrant Americans who participated in any capacity, in actual hostilities, one against the other, or in any passive activity with each other are eligible ancestors.

Eligibility shall be based upon lineal descent and the time period of service is 1607-1900.

## **FEES AND OTHER INFORMATION**

The application fees are set by the governing body of the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars. The Society has both annual and life memberships.

The Society holds an annual weekend Council in September. All members are invited to attend. other business meetings are held from time to time as needed at the call of the Governor General.
